25 YEARS OF BEING IN THE HOAGIE-BUILDING BUSINESS

Thanks to **Scott and Lori Vercoe**, and their very able crew, for conducting a very successful Hoagie Sale. 1520 hoagies were sold this year, and each year the sale gets

bigger and better. However, not to burst your bubble, but during the May 1982 sale 1561 hoagies were sold, and the Troop had two sales a year at that time. The participation of the parents and adult members of the Troop was great; i.e. cutting the meat and cheese and making the setups and subsequent assembly. The scouts did a fantastic job selling and delivering them.

As we were doing the "drill" of building hoagies, some of the new parents started asking me questions about past sales, how long we have doing this, how many have we sold, etc. I guess, because I have white hair, they thought I have been to a few of these sessions. They are right. The Troop started selling hoagies 25 years ago (1982), and it was initially started, and it is so today, to enable scouts to earn money for their Scout Accounts to use for trips not paid for by the Troop.

Now, some notes from the archives. The first sale was in January 1982. **Charlie and Jane Fry** ran the sales from that time until 1999, and there were two sales a year. Up to 1999, 32,500+ hoagies were sold. In 1999 we replaced one of the two hoagie sales with the Annual Popcorn Sale, and in 2004 the Poinsettia Sale was started. (Each of these sales mentioned, plus the Radnor Hunt Races, gives each scout an opportunity to earn money for his Scout Account.)

You must realize that hoagies were a lot less expensive in 1982 — but we also had fewer scouts in the troop. Everything being relevant!!!!

Anyway, you are doing a great job, Scott and Lori.

The total to date? Give or take a few, we are pushing 40,000!!!!!!!
